## Speech by Prof. Dr. Federico Foders, held at the 1<sup>st</sup> "Cologne Latin America Symposium" on 17 October 2005, 9am, at the University of Cologne, Main Building, New Senate's Chamber (Check against delivery)

Lord Mayor Schramma, University President Professor Freimuth, Ladies and Gentlemen,

It is a great pleasure for me to welcome you all to the first Cologne Latin America Symposium on behalf of the organizers. We would like to dedicate this symposium to Professor Manfred Feldsieper who, for more than a decade, contributed substantially to strengthen research and teaching activities related to Latin America in this University and who is now retiring.

The symposium gathers leading thinkers in Latin American affairs from different disciplines and at a very particular moment in the history of Latin America. The transformation of Latin American countries is clearly underway. Latin American countries seem to finally have learnt the important lesson that macroeconomic policies should be consistent and that they should also be compatible with other areas of public policy.
